MEETING THE PANTHER PACK

It all started with me thinking, this kid would be awesome on camera. I spent the rest of the night pondering why I hadn't yet included this one kid in our morning video announcements. The next day, I smoothed out all of the details. I found how I could subtly film the guy I so desperately wanted to film, who would be on camera with him (hint, it was Milaad), and what they would be doing on screen. And that was how Meeting the Panther Pack started.

So, what even is Meeting the Panther Pack? It is our, the inclusivity commissioners, job to try and make sure that every voice is heard and this is how we do it. Every week we walk As we said before, there are some cons to this, we are around the school, trying to find a random student from each grade and a staff member to interview. We want to get a spontaneous, natural response from each person so that our message is entertaining for everyone to watch. Because of that goal, we do not film leadership students and do not tell our interviewees the questions beforehand. We make an effort to choose diverse questions to make it more interesting for our peers to watch. We usually just walk around the school and ask people if they want to be filmed, but sometimes people come up to us and ask to be filmed which is the greatest feeling in the world knowing that someone out there knows you.

Tips for making your own interview segment for videos:

- 1. Film your friends first. Recording people you know helps you interview process should be a huge success. Go out there, find your flow and secures your process. It also assists the school in getting used to the interviews.
- 2. Find entertaining questions. We looked up "funny questions to ask strangers" and then made a whole list of questions to use. We try to get random questions like "What is the worst song to get stuck in your head all day long? Will you sing me asking them random questions. a verse?" and "Do you think you're tall?"
- 3.Get an outsider's opinion. Humor varies, especially between leadership students and our peers. I (Isabella) always ask my brother his opinion while filming and editing the video. We also have our friend pick the questions we ask, so we get another layer of humor.
- 4. Make sure you film everyone. We walk around the school, stopping in the office and at different lunch tables, when we try to find people to film. The two of us also attempt to film different genders, races, friend groups, etc.
- 5.Get the proper supplies and know how to use it. We bought a microphone to use because we film students during lunch and it gets LOUD. Our microphone helps single out voices and creates a sense of professionalism.

Of course with any activity like this, there are many pros and cons but they never hold us back.

Some pros that we have seen are the following:

• More people watch the video announcements because maybe they will see someone they know.



- People want to participate, they get excited when they see Milaad walking around.
- It's fun and connects the school. You see all types of people on the video announcements now, not just the standard leadership student.

By taking all of our advice and being aware of all the pros and cons, this come up with a catchy title, advertise a lot to your students, and see the growth of your new weekly activity. There are always new things to learn about your scholars and we invite you to go out and learn everything by filming yourself

- 1. Do a complete makeover of your "backroom/storage" space. Take everything out, clean, sort, label, and put it back in. Take photos (you are welcome.)









The California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) plays a vital role in organizing and managing high school sports across the state. While its primary focus has traditionally been on athletic competitions, recent developments have highlighted an increasing emphasis on environmental considerations that extend to all aspects of school life, including both athletics and activities. Let's explore the emerging environmental challenges that are poised to significantly impact CIF's operations and high school activities throughout California.

One of the most pressing concerns is the escalating temperatures driven by climate change, which have profound implications for outdoor activities, including sports. Recognizing the risks posed by extreme heat, California has enacted legislation to address heat index concerns, aiming to safeguard the well-being of studentathletes. Assembly Bill 1653 imposes strict guidelines for outdoor activities during high heat conditions. CIF schools are required to comply with these regulations, which include implementing heat acclimatization protocols, ensuring access to hydration stations, and scheduling events during cooler times of the day. The goal of this legislation is to protect students from heat-related illnesses. This will impact Activities when Athletic contests and practices are postponed or canceled and rescheduled. It will be important to work closely with the Athletic Directors. CIF's proactive measures in offering discounted wet bulbs to measure heat index is important. Each school district will need to decide how to purchase these required wet bulbs and since this is mandated by the state law, ASB funds should not be used.

In addition to the challenges posed by heat, CIF member schools must also contend with air quality management, particularly during wildfire seasons. Wildfires release harmful pollutants into the air, posing health risks for everyone, including athletes and students engaged in outdoor activities. To address this issue, California has implemented laws mandating air quality



monitoring and adherence to prescribed protocols. Schools are required to adjust schedules, relocate events, or cancel activities if air quality reaches unhealthy levels, ensuring the protection of students from exposure-related health risks. Again, It will be imperative to work closely with the administration when rescheduling of events happens because of air quality issues.

As California continues to grapple with these environmental challenges, it is clear that the landscape of high school sports and activities is evolving to prioritize the health and safety of students. In response to these challenges, California's latest legislation emphasizes the importance for schools to have comprehensive emergency action plans and accessible AED machines within 3 minutes of activities, further highlighting the commitment to student well-being.

CIF's initiatives extend beyond sports events to encompass all school activities, ensuring that student safety is paramount across all facets of campus life. Through collaboration and compliance with these regulations, California is poised to lead the way in fostering a resilient and sustainable future in high school sports and activities, thereby creating a safe and healthy environment for students.

What is it? School Wide Rock Paper Scissors Activity When is it? January 19th, 2024 all-day

How does it work? After watching the announcements, students will receive one beaded necklace from their teacher which indicates that the challenge has started for them. Students will play rock paper scissors with a designated player that has one or more necklaces, whoever wins the rock paper scissors game will get ALL the necklaces the person they played (Ex. if you have 1 necklace, and you play someone with 18 necklaces, you get all of their 18 necklaces). The way to compete in the final game of rock paper scissors by the end of the day, you must have 10 or more necklaces by the 6th period, then 15 minutes before the 6th period ends we will announce on the all-call for competitors to come to Mrs. Carson's room (F2) to battle it out.

Will students want to do this? Why? Students will most definitely want to do this activity because it is short and simple, and everyone knows how to play rock paper scissors, and the best part is, is that they get a snack basket with an SDHS hoodie if they win the whole competition.

What needs to be done:

Order 10 bulk beaded necklaces from oriental trading (link) Make a one saying "School-wide rock paper scissors"

- Sort necklaces for teachers
- Send ASB members to homerooms with necklaces and a script (if their homeroom teacher doesn't watch the announcements)
- Make Video for announcements (WITH TRANSITIONS)

Jacob: After the announcements, your teachers are going to hand out one beaded necklace to each student *Hand necklaces to 2 people*.

Jacob: *2 people play rock paper scissors then freeze* Now, the person who lost has to give all their necklaces to the person that won and if you lost, you are out of the competition.

Violet: Your goal is to have 10 or more necklaces by the 7th period when we will call on the all-call for everyone to compete in the final battle of rock paper scissors that will be held in Mrs. Carson's room.

Jacob: The remaining people will battle it out until there is one winner left, and that winner will get a cool prize!

Violet: We can't wait to see who comes out on top!




AREA A: PATTY JUDGE RETIRED/ALL RISE FOUNDATION

BRINGING SPEAKERS TO YOUR PUBLIC SCHOOL: NAVIGATING ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES

Introducing guest speakers to public schools can help students learn new things and get inspired. These speakers can talk about all kinds of topics, making school more interesting. For example, they might talk about their jobs or share stories about their lives. This can help students think about what they want to do in the future and what they're interested in. Guest speakers also come from different backgrounds, so they bring different and diverse perspectives to the table. This can help students see things from new angles and think more broadly. The speakers can present and unite the student body on a theme that can be referred to throughout the school year.

But there are challenges too. Bringing in guest speakers can cost a lot of money. Schools have to pay for things like the speaker's fee, travel expenses, and where they'll stay. This can take away money from other important things at school. Plus, it can be tricky to organize everything. Sometimes, it's hard to find a good time for the speaker to come, especially if they have to travel far. Schools also have to make sure the speaker's message fits with what they teach and believe in. This means they have to do a lot of planning and checking beforehand.

To make things easier, schools can team up with other schools nearby to share the costs. This way, they can bring in



speakers to tour a different school each day or even share days. Travel costs are cut, hotel deals can be struck and even the speaker fees can be negotiated. It's also important to pick topics that students care about and relate to what they're learning. Another Idea is having the speaker speak to the entire school one day and then, have smaller sessions with the speaker on the next day. This way, students can ask questions and get involved in unique ways with the message. Usually, speaker costs go down significantly when they can schedule multiple days out. And sometimes, it's a good idea to have the speaker stick around for a bit longer during lunch or after school. Speakers could work with teachers or parents after school to make sure their message sticks. Creativity in speaker's schedule is only an ask away.

In the end, bringing in guest speakers can be a great thing for public schools and the cost of a speaker could end up being less than \$1.00 a day per person if you use the tips in the article to plan out the event. Even though it can be hard to plan and cost money, the benefits are worth it. Students learn new things, hear different perspectives, and maybe find some inspiration for their futures. So, with careful planning and teamwork, schools can make sure that bringing in guest speakers is a success for everyone involved.

Imagine if you will, a warm spring evening, a red carpet, punch fountains sparkling with fruit juice, pretty dresses and fancy suits...and a limo. Sprinkle in about 500 students and families, and you've stumbled into THE event of the year on campus...The Fllies.

The Ellies are an Oscar-esque glam event that highlights the achievements of our school electives. This event invites students from drama, band, art, ed tech and yes, even student leadership, to celebrate the accomplishments and achievements of student work. Categories are designed by each content teacher and focus on student character, talent, and perseverance. Some content areas also incorporate a peer voting process for awards that range from community building, sharing information, or creative skill.

Teachers curate a list of award recipients and invite their students to the event. However, all students in the elective classes are encouraged to attend. The key is that the winners are not aware of what award they are getting until the "Oscar" moment when it's announced live at the event. Trophies are ordered and each elective category has a specific trophy designed for its content: i.e. theater masks for theater arts, a paint pallet for art, a computer for ed-tech, etc. Names are collected by the organizing teacher weeks prior to the event and each trophy is personalized.



As with any large event, lots of prework and organization takes place beginning in January. The elective teachers form committees and call on the support of parents. When the event first started, all decorations new needed to be ordered. White Christmas lights are used to line the red carpet in the

gymnasium. Homemade stanchions were made to drape the lights (and a bonus, can be used year to year). Hollywood-type decorations were purchased but have been stored and reused each year. Items like the red carpet, punch fountains and redrope stanchions are secured through a local rental establishment. Letters are written and shared between teachers and their parent community for monetary donations or even decorations. A light dessert buffet is served, and napkins and cups...and gallons of punch are needed!

But the highlight of the evening is the LIMO ride....in the school parking lot! Funds for the limo are secured either by a parent donation or PTO funding. The key is informing the limo company that the driver will be circling the school parking lot...for about 2 hours! Our school site has an upper and lower parking lot. Students are dropped off at the upper parking lot, and are then managed by a teacher volunteer who monitors the loading of student groups into the limo. The limo then drives to the lower



parking lot by the gymnasium and when they exit the limo... here's the fun part...teachers on staff have volunteered to be paparazzi! Right down to the badges they wear and the cameras around their neck. It is HILARIOUS....paparazzi are screaming at the kids, "What are you wearing? Who are you with?" The students stop and pose for photographs at a backdrop just like any celebrity at an awards show. We have created a gallery area for parents to gather so that they may also capture memories of their child walking the red carpet in all their glory.

Over time, we have added little pieces to the event, such as an art gallery outside the gymnasium highlighting student work. Tables have been added outside to display other items from any of the elective classes. This allows parents and the community to view the tremendous work our students have created.

Once inside, the students are welcomed by a formal red carpet down the middle of the gymnasium, flanked on the sides by tables decorated with tablecloths, balloons and other decorations. Parents volunteer to decorate the area so as to keep it a surprise for the students. The theme is always "Hollywood Glam," but we add different props and decorations each year. The punch fountains are streaming cold refreshments and parent volunteers are monitoring the dessert buffet. We have found that with the invitations to the event, it is easy to ask each family to contribute to the dessert buffet with either a monetary donation or an actual dessert item.

And then the gala begins! Each elective teacher has their turn at the podium to formally announce each award and each winner is then directed to walk up the red carpet amongst all the applause and receive their award. There is a perfect moment at the stage where the student can be photographed with their teacher or other students. We haven't added in student speeches, just to keep the evening moving. This might be something to consider in the future. Overall, from start to finish, the event is about 2 hours long, including the limo ride.
