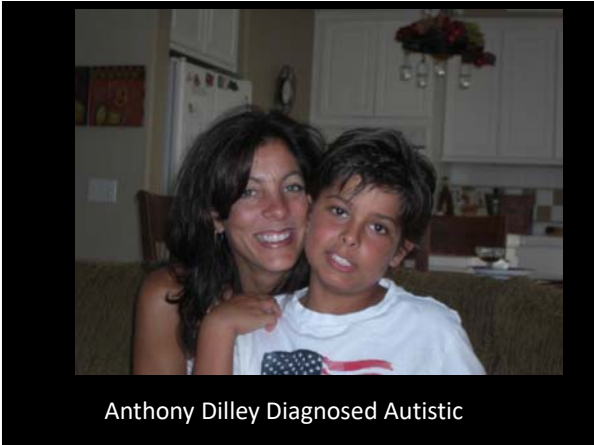
A Look at Statistics...

About **1 in 68** children has been identified with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) according to estimates from CDC's Autism and Developmental Disabilities Monitoring (ADDMM) Network.

ASD is reported to occur in all racial, ethnic, and socioeconomic groups.

ASD is about 4.5 times more common among boys (1 in 42) than among girls (1 in 189).

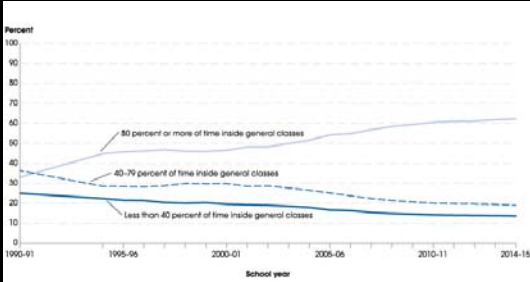
About 1 in 6 children in the United States had a developmental disability in 2006-2008, ranging from mild disabilities such as speech and language impairments to serious developmental disabilities, such as intellectual disabilities, cerebral palsy, and autism.



Children and Youth With Disabilities
SEP (Last Updated: May 2017)
In 2014–15, the number of children and youth ages 3–21 receiving special education services was 6.6 million, or 13 percent of all public school students. Among children and youth receiving special education services, 35 percent had specific learning disabilities.

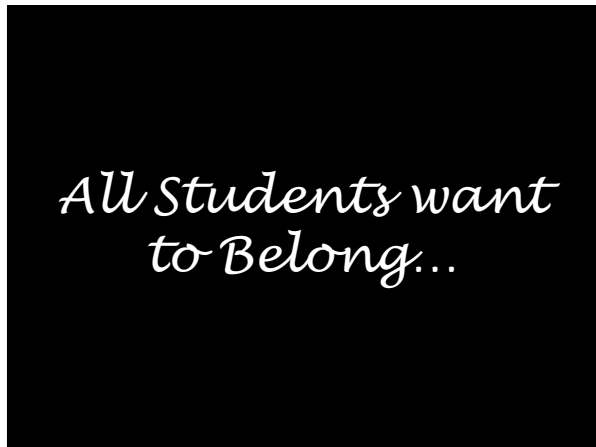


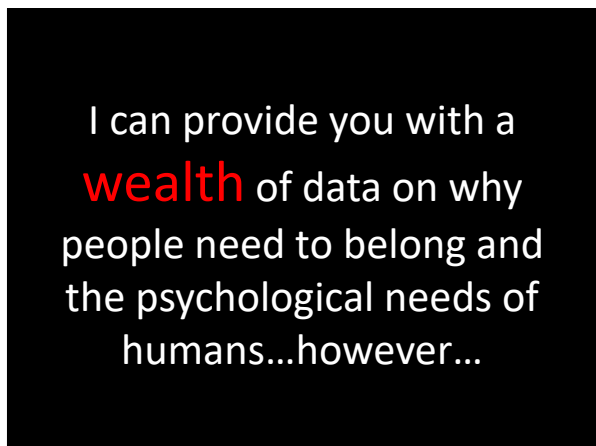

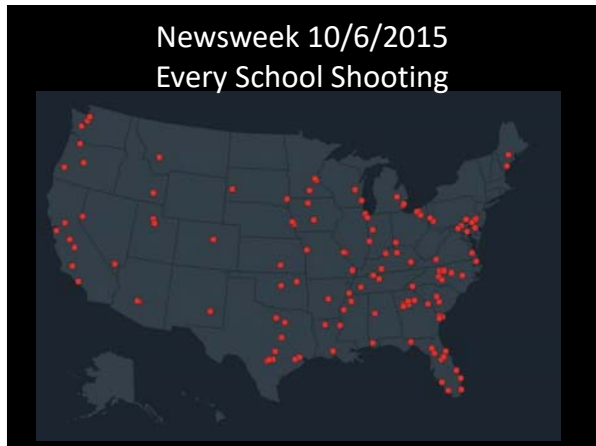


(CNN)Here is a list of incidents of random elementary, middle and high school (excludes colleges and universities) violence with fatalities, from 1927 to the present. This list does NOT include suicides, gang-related incidents, or deaths resulting from interpersonal conflicts.

US Timeline (selected only):

- January 23, 2018 - Marshall County High School - Bottom, Kentucky. [A 15-year-old male student opens fire killing two and injuring 18 others.](#) The suspect is arrested at the scene.
- December 7, 2017 - Artes High School - Artes, New Mexico. [A 17-year-old male opens fire on a classroom killing a student and injuring 11 others.](#) A former student at the high school, died of what police believe to be a self-inflicted gunshot wound.
- September 13, 2017 - Freeman High School - Spokane, Washington. [A 16-year-old male opens fire on the gymnasium, wounding 10 students and a teacher.](#) The suspect is a sophomore at the school.
- April 10, 2017 - North Park Elementary School - San Bernardino, California. [A 17-year-old male opens fire on the classroom, wounding 10 students and a teacher.](#) Smith's estranged husband, walks into her special needs classroom and opens fire, armed with a large-caliber revolver. Two other students are wounded. Anderson then kills himself.
- September 28, 2016 - Townville Elementary School - Greenville, South Carolina. [A 14-year-old male opens fire on the classroom, wounding 10 children and a teacher.](#) Jacob Hall, one of the wounded children, dies three days later. Before going to the school, the teen shot and killed his father. He is in custody.
- October 24, 2014 - Marysville-Pilchuck High School - Marysville, Washington. Freshman Jaylen Fryberg shoots five people in the school cafeteria, killing one. Fryberg dies of a self-inflicted gunshot wound at the scene. A second victim dies of her injuries two days later; a third dies on October 31. [A 17-year-old male opens fire on the classroom, wounding 10 children and a teacher.](#) bringing the total fatalities to five, including the gunman.
- June 10, 2014 - Reynolds High School - Trowaldale, Oregon. [A 17-year-old male opens fire on the gymnasium, wounding 10 children and a teacher.](#) Jacob Hall, one of the wounded children, dies three days later. Before going to the school, the teen shot and killed his father. He is in custody.
- December 13, 2013 - Arapahoe High School - Centennial, Colorado. [A 17-year-old male opens fire on the classroom, wounding 10 children and a teacher.](#) Karl Pierson, 18, opens fire inside, critically injuring one student and then killing himself.
- October 21, 2013 - Sparks Middle School - Sparks, Nevada. [A 17-year-old male opens fire on the classroom, wounding 10 children and a teacher.](#) A 17-year-old male student and a teacher and Marine veteran. He then kills himself, injuring two 13-year-old male students and killing Mike Lumberry, a teacher and Marine veteran. He then kills himself.
- December 14, 2012 - Sandy Hook Elementary School - Newtown, Connecticut. [A 20-year-old male opens fire on the classroom, wounding 10 children and a teacher.](#) Adam Lanza, 20, was down 20 children, ages 6 and 7, and six adults. [A 20-year-old male opens fire on the classroom, wounding 10 children and a teacher.](#) Investigating police later find Nancy Lanza, Adam's mother, dead from a gunshot wound. The final count is 28 dead, including the shooter.
- February 27, 2012 - Chardon High School - Chardon, Ohio. Student Daniel Parmeter, 16, is killed and four others wounded when student T.J. Lane, 17, opens fire in the school. On February 28, Demetrius Hestlin, 16, dies from his wounds and Russell King Jr., 17, is declared brain dead. In March 2011, [A 17-year-old male opens fire on the classroom, wounding 10 children and a teacher.](#) He is captured early the next morning.
- January 5, 2011 - Millard South High School, Omaha, Nebraska. 17-year-old Robert Butler Jr. opens fire on Principal Curtis Case and Vice Principal Vicki Kruper. Butler then kills himself about a mile from the school. Vice principal Kruper later dies at the hospital.
- February 5, 2010 - Discovery Middle School, Madison, Alabama. 14-year-old Todd Brown dies after being shot in the head in a school hallway. Fellow ninth grader Hammond Memon later pleads guilty and is sentenced to 30 years in prison.
- October 16, 2009 - Carolina Forest High School, Conway, South Carolina. 16-year-old student Trevor Varinez is shot and killed by a police officer after allegedly pulling a knife and stabbing the officer.
- September 23, 2009 - John Tyler High School, Tyler, Texas. A 16-year-old Byron Truvia is taken into custody for stabbing and killing high school teacher Todd R. Henry. Truvia is later found unfit to stand trial.

Special Friends Committee
Students sitting with kids who are alone and isolated at lunch, making new friends and including those who are left out.
*19 students have spent 44 of their lunch days spending time with their special friends.

Team Time Tutor Time
Students helping our English Learners Population with academic studies and language acquisition during both lunches as well as after school on Tuesdays.
*15 students spend 133 hours tutoring kids who recently moved to the U.S. making them feel welcomed and included.

Chalk Talk
Students chalked our school on random days spreading positive messages and reminders of how to be a good friend.
*An average of 10-12 students chalked the school campus once a month, before and after school...putting in about 60 hours of work in.

Poster People


