

To achieve this region/school goal we have intentionally taken actions to make our campus "look" inclusive in order to "feel" safe.



Diversity Assembly

It's our oldest tradition and completely ran by students. We have a Diversity Commissioner who works on this event all year. It has 2 major components

- Performances
- Fashion Show (flags)



Performances

They come dramatically from campus clubs. The only "class" in the show is our folklorico group - all of the rest are clubs or student groups. It is very acceptable at Sunnyside for kids to mix into their friends cultures.

We create a google doc and kids are allowed to sign up to carry the flag of their choice, but if more than one student chooses the same flag we then the commissioner decides who gets to carry the flag by their involvement at work nights (creating art for the walls). Creating Social Equity

Each year we poll the staff and students to ask if there is a flag they want to see included at assembly. In 2019 we added a Pride element to the show due to requests. Including a Pride flag serves to deepen student understanding of their world and identities. Overall, the display encourages respect for all at Sunnyside giving a group who has traditionally been underrepresented, greater social equity.









Mobile Museums Around Campus



Building a temporary museum in the SHS library created a greater awareness about significant LGBTQ+ people and events. More importantly, this exhibit offered a broader understanding of our world and history, thus supporting a more affirming and inclusive culture at SHS. We have one for Black History Month too.



Continuing Social Equity by Editing Traditions

We have made a shift in how we handle homecoming and prom. We no longer elect King and Queens, but rather we elect Royalty. At prom last year we named 4 students Homecoming Royalty and thus widend our net for capturing more involvement.



A Simple Step – Visual Representation

At Sunnyside we often use inclusive visual representation. This small thing can lead to a less hostile school experiences and increased feelings of connectedness to the school community. The steps Sunnyside has taken benefits all students by promoting diversity and teaching students about the myriad of identities in their communities. We work hard to make kids feel welcome by experiencing visual support. The use of mobile museums, T-shirts, themed dress up weeks, lunch time events, and flags that are hung year-round in the cafeteria have gone a long way to visually show our diversity to make our school feel inclusive.

Diversity Assembly - Sunnyside's Grandest Tradition

- We celebrated 13 cultures through 15 performances in past assemblies.
- The assembly is completely student led under the direction of our Diversity Commissioner.
- The dances are often a multicultural bunch of students supporting a unique culture.
- It ends with what we call the "fashion show," which is a presentation of flags carried in by students dressed in cultural attire (that may or may not match the flag).
- Four years ago, we included a rainbow flag at the request of the student body to deepen the understanding of diversity because it is bigger than just race.
- This assembly supports students' abilities to empathize, connect, and collaborate with a diverse group of peers, skills that are of increasing importance in our multicultural, global society.
- This assembly encourages respect for all at Sunnyside.

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
